their final project, by the end of week twelve. The remaining three weeks focused on watching plays only. This was a very effective strategy in that it provided students with an opportunity to discuss six plays (in addition to the six we watched in the first twelve weeks) using all of knowledge of theatre they learned in the course work. This made for very meaningful, in depth discussion of each play. In most cases, there was much more to be said about the plays we had watched and conversations continued past the end of class almost every time we met. I will continue with this strategy in the next year.

Additionally, I implemented a subscription to Digital Theatre Plus. It is an online source for videos of plays (not movies based on plays) and provided students with literally hundreds of plays to watch, along with interviews with actors, directors, designers and technicians. Thorough analysis of plays and genres were also available. The site provided a valuable tool for me and for students. I paid for the source from my own resources and am hoping the subscription can be picked up by the library in the future. The subscription provided equitable access to plays for all students.
