He wishes \$4,000. of this amount placed on time deposit on interest, and the balance of \$750. to remain on checking account.

Henry Jamison is accompanied by Harry Jamison, his son, Jamison is a man 57 years of age, and if further identification is desired, I can do so by phone. One positive identification, is two gold teeth in front.

I am glad to see Jamison have this amount placed on deposit, and while he is a patent in fee Indian and not under Government restriction, I am glad to do what I can for his interests.

My dear Mr. Hayes:

I am writing you in the interests of Annie Jamison,
Indian woman of Mono Lake who has come to me for a settlement
with her husband, Henry Jamison.

Henry Jamison is a patent in fee Indian, he sold his
land some months ago to the Civil Irrigation Company for \$5,000.
The most of this money was deposited in the Lyon County Bank of
Yerington, Nevada. Since, I understand that he has drawn some
of this money, and has at present \$5,500. in the bank.
The wife, Annie Jamison asks a divorced alimony.
According to the California, I rather believe she may be able
to claim about 1/3 or near \$1,500. I have tried to get them
to make a settlement out of court, but Jamison positively
refuses to do so, and has expressed his final wish to go to
Court. I have advised Annie Jamison and her daughter Alice
Rambeau to see you. Jamison being a patent in fee Indian, he
has a right to go to Court with his affairs, but I am anxious
to see his wife get a fair deal. I would suggest ~~that~~ or request
that you take it up, and take his money in the bank, until a set-
tlement is made.

I hope that you will take the case up for them.
