Dear Sir:- I have your letter of the 11th in reference to the situation at Ruby Valley. I doubt if there is any thing I can say to those Indians that will help the situation.

I know that there is no funds available at this time that could be used in the purchase of your property as you suggest. I had hoped that we would find the means of buying the particular 40 that the Indians had used to remove that cause of controversy but until some appropriation can be secured that can not be done, and the appropriation is uncertain though we think we have some prospect of getting something for such purpose by next Congress.

After our conversation in Elyo in May I wrote suggesting that some other man be sent in there. Such detail has been made and a man who has been working in Utah is to make a recift and to take the question up with the Indians. He came here a few days ago to go over the matter with and he has all the data necessary to a clear understanding of the situation and he will go in there as soon as he can get to it. He is on the coast just now and will not be back to Salt Lake until about the middle of August. I am doubtful if he can get there before the first of September as work will have accumulated on his desk that will require attention on his return.

I will write them a letter but I do not believe it will do much good.

I hope that Mr. Creel will be able to review the situation with them in a way that will lead to an adjustment of the difference without resort to the courts. Even if you had some of them arrested it would probably only afford temporary relief and might be an additional aggravation that would make the situation worse in the end.

I am sending copies of this correspondence to Mr. Creel.

Dear Sir :-

Your letter of April 7th. was recd. in camp at Lamoille and have waited for some data on the ditch that I wished to send to you but as that has not arrived yet I did not want to delay answering any longer.

I will write to you again as soon as we get the data and try to present the facts as they are. I am afraid you have been misinformed as we have no idea of depriving the Indians of any rights and we are willing to help them if possible.

We will appreciate any information you may send in regard to our right of way for our ditch.

On the 31st. of last month I wrote Mr. Kearney in regard to the Indians out in Ruby as they took so much water last year that we could not get enough for the small crop we had in. If they used the water and did not waste it there would be plenty for all the land they had in and all we have under cultivation through this ditch.

Will try to see you the next time you come out this way and if that will not be right soon I will try to explain the best I can by letter.
