As you have shown an interest in these matters in the past i #f/f/ an taking this liberty with you and will appreciate any information you can give me.

Dear Sir;-Your letter of the 7th has just been forwarded to me here. I will try to learn as soon as po sible whether any filing for aterms made for Fishman and Spud and if not we may be able to I have been away from my office on sundry field file it soon. work almost constantly since last Fall with the result that the regular work of the office has been somewhat prowded out.

"You did not say as to thefiling that Alex Mike is attempting to make on that land. It may be that this application will be referred to my office before it is accepted if it is an allotment application as they are being handled a little differently now and there is some question as to geting on accepted just at this time.

The way my work is now arranged there is some question as to my being able to get over there but I still hope to and if I can not go I may be able to sand a clark over to look the situation over.

We will try to protect the right of the Indians who have made godd use of the little water there is.

I appreciate your interest in these people and your calling our attention to the conditions and hope that we will find time to do something for them. Urge them to make use of the water to the fullest possible extent to hold their right.

The Alec Niko proposition and also Gone ever. the Wike and Spud and Fisherman ers related, he informs me, and are working for the Fine Greek Eunch. I explained to him how Alea Wike's Application could not be filed, although an attempt had been made to like it, on account of the new regulations and new forms had not yet been received. Also has fenced about 50 sores in the three forties to the east and has a garden and condiderable of the land plowed and has his tent on the land. He secures his water from Pisherman's ditch. However, he lives more at Figherman's than on his own land and at Mr. Clar's suggestion wrote him to build his house as soon as possible. As to the water troubles. Fr. Cler says that there is no trouble between these parties. At his suggestion, I wrote to Rogers, stating the case, so that notation could be made on the records, as threats have been made of filing over Alecia claims. He also offerred to make an affidavit as to Alec's improvements and file that in the land office.

As to the Tim Hosper case, he gave me some idea of the case, but met Mr. Atkinson at the hotel and advised him to see me while in town and give no particulars, which the latter intends to do on Monday, as he left for San Francisco. Mr. Atkinson is the attorney for the Pine Creek people, which I are posted last Sall. It seems that Them had another alletment or attempted to get and, and englosly changed his mind and took up his present allotsmot. Stimmler and March owned some land in this some neighborhood but it was mortgaged and the Conopah Banking Co. foreclosed the mortgage. There upon They sought revente. Thy it and directed against the Pine Creek people, he did not know. The Pine Creak people, or rather some predecessor had taken out a desert filing on this land. One year they inadvertantly did not file the annual statement of improvements, which eruncelled the filing. Not being aware of this atste of effairs, these people continued to improve and cultivate the land. It appears that Stimuler got wise to till state of affrirs and induced Hooper to become their tool and he placed his filing on this tract right in the center of the Pine Creek holdings on land partly cultivated and which they were actively engaged in proparing for the season's crops. Hooper gets his water from Anderson Creek. but has threatened to also take water from the Fisherman creek. He has become acquainted with the fact that Alac has not filed on his land and has threatened to place his

wife or children on the tract. This knowledge of Alec's not having filed, evidently come from Etimbler also.

Alec is much excited over the mitaation.

Clar in a friend of Stimuler's and stated the alteration as it was and does not wented to be quoted in the matter. He also mentioned, though savisedly, that the Pine Creek spoyle are perfektor the land between Time and Anderson Preci and sill coprive him of water from that secree. Very few people know this wie be just got the Rooper, he says, in rather everbearing, information. and the other Indians are afraid of his threats, which statement is also borne out by our files. y will probably hear more of this matter from Athinson, Monday. expect we must take some of these statements with possibly some leeway and get if this is the effection in a general way and the fine Creek/really have some equity in this land, even though they may not have clear title, is will not help our office, now the Indians in that neighborhood, if we proclaim his cause under the direumstances.
