While teaching at Death Valley, California, I wrote you in regard to some of the Indian children living there. The school board compelled them to attend school for the last few weeks and they will no doubt go regularly after this.

One of them, hewever, should be in the school at Renc. She is Belle Carney, nine years old and unable to speak English. She is with her aunt, Mary Soctt, who is also her guardism. The aunt takes very little interest in the girl and the surreundings are the worst a child could have. Aside from this, the sunt is old and will not be able to make a living for the girl and other members of the family such lenger. I have taken a great deal of interest in Belle and would like to have her in aplease where the moral surroundings would be of the best. Besides this, you understand that a child of nine who has never been in school needs special attention.

We have had some correspondence with the author of the said letter, during the past winter in reference to the school situation in that district, especially as it related to the Indian children and have also had a letter from the Indian woman, who is the gaurdian of girl. The school officials appear to be ready to to cooperate with the Government in the education of the children and we will no doubt have a tuition contract in operation with this district during the ensuing year.

It is our intention to visit this locality at the earliest date possible in order to investigate school conditions, but in case any of recruiting staff should be in the vicinity, it might be well to look up the girl, Belle Carney, and if the conditions there demand it, enroll the child in your school.


