

Dear Sir:-

Poor, no food, no hay for poor horse.
Born at Star Valley and raised among white people.
Tom Web Preacher wants Govt. Land too.
Wants up Elko County.
Land North of Wells, Johnnie Creek.
Roams Creek, Gold Springs, Bull Creek. North East or East. of Wells
Your ancestors took land, gold etc. Owe us money which we may
need to fix up land.
Not citizens, can not take up land or mine.
Very poor.
Ruby Valley Indians had trouble about mines. Left off the loca-
tion notice.
Industrious, use our money right.

I received your letter some time ago. Glad to hear from you.

I have wrote and answered your letter to Ruby Valley Nev. I will tell you all I can this time, since my last trip to Washington D.C. (I found that the Treaty was made with Shoshoni Nation at Ruby Valley Nev. I am telling you all I know about this land matter. this is the treaty 1863 at Ruby Valley.

Treaty with Western Shoshoni 1863.

Treaty of peace and friendship made at Ruby Valley, in the Territory of Nevada, this first day of October, A D one thousand eight hundred sixty three between the United States of America, represented by the undersigned commissioners, and the Western Bands of the Shoshoni Nation of Indians represented by their chiefs and principal men and warriors, as follows. I want state any thing about articles I, II III and article IV by Art. V it is understood that the boundaries of the country claimed and occupied by said bands are defined and described by them as follows; On the North by Tong-gaga-da mountains and Shoshone River Valley; on the West Hu-non-to-yah mountains or Smith Creek mountains; on the South by ~~the~~ Wi-co-bah and the Colorado Desert; on the East by Po-no-no-be Valley or Steptoe Valley and Great Salt Lake Valley.

Article 6. The said bands agree that whenever the President of the United States shall deem it expedient for them to abandon their roaming life which they now lead and become herdsmen or agricultural-

ists he is hereby authorized to make such reservation of (for) their use as he may deem necessary within the country above described and they do also hereby agree to remove their camps to such reservations as he may indicate, and to reside and remain therein.

This is all I know since I been to Washington D.C.

I copy this from the treaty book which I got at hand, Indian Affairs Laws and Treaties. Vol II Treaties.

I likes to go and see the Indians there myself and talk to them, but I havent got any money to pay my expenses there and return.

I wrote to Harry Preacher and Joe Simoke last Fall but never got no reply to my letter. All my family are well and my brother Johnny Dankey is well, he is at my home for all the Winter. Some of these Indians are going to Washington D.C. on an Indian business in the month of April. Many Indians deceased last winter.

I cant write good enough to satisfy the readers. Please tell your chiefs about this letter, according to this treaty of 1833 you Indians are entitled to take up land at Ruby Valley Nev.
