I am now in receipt of a request from him for an allotment in Township 11 E. Bange 46 E, which appears to be outside of the Forest reserve. Please let me know, what disposition was made of the former application, as to whether it was ever approved by your office and forwarded.

I had hoped to make a personal examination of the land in question, but it has not been possible for me to do so, up to date.

Mr. Hooper objected to the report and called for a re-examination. Gentlemen:

I enclose herewith the application of Tim Hoopez for the SW? of the EER and the EER of the EER of Section 21 and the EWR of the EWR of Section 22 and the EWR of the EWR of Section 22. I ll E., R. 46 R., this application being made under the 4th Section of the General Allotment Act. The applications to be in proper form.

As the General Land Office has been calling for special report on the eligibility of Indians to take up land under this act, I will state that Tim Hooper is a Shoshoni Indian. He has never lived on any reservation. He has no reservation rights. He has not taked up land on the public domain before. He applies for this land in good faith, for the purpose of making a home for himself. So far he has not made any permanent improvements on the land, but propose to move on it at once, with a view to making use of the land and establishing his home thereon. I consider him as typical of the class of Indians for whom this particular law was enseted and recommend the approval of his application.

I suggest that you attach a copy of this letter to the application, when it is forwarded to the General Land Office, which may to a subsequent report.

If you move on the land and have any trouble with owners of adjacent land, we will be glad to have a report and if the circumstances justify it, we will take the matter up for you.
